If, instead of Eden, we refer to the idyllic life as the kingdom of God, or heaven on earth, or the Promised Land, then we come closer to understanding the teachings and miraculous works of Jesus. He taught us what it is like, how to live there, and how to be effective ambassadors in extending God's kingdom, manifesting its redeeming power just as he did. I often view the torn temple curtain as the Eden gate thrown wide open for us again. So let's see what it's like, approaching the Promised Land, just as Joshua did. What can we expect?

Joshua brings the people to the Jordan river bank - they are not in the land, but they know of the land, a land full of the promise of milk and honey, overflowing with fruitfulness, a beautiful but temporal image of the eternal kingdom that Jesus displayed and taught. God tells them to take the biggest spiritual risk of their entire lives; but with the rewards being unimaginable. They are to take up the Ark of the Lord, containing everything they believe they know about God, and step into the raging river. There is a risk - to mortal man the task seems insane, if not impossible. Why not wait until the floodwaters have subsided? Why not build a bridge? But there can be no argument when God says "Go!" They step towards the muddy flood; one wrong step and the whole beating heart of the nation will be gone. But it is the only way, just as it is the only way forward for the church today. We have to take exactly the same risk with our out-of-focus Jesus. To step out in obedience will show us who he really is, not the other way around.

Now see his grace! Into the flood of doubt, cynicism and scepticism step the priests. It only takes one toe to demonstrate obedience and trust, and almost instantly they find themselves in the middle of the river, on dry land! And an army of thousands marches past them into the Promised Land – it is as easy, and as difficult, as that.

Straight away they begin to eat the fruits of their new home – and what a joyful banquet this is for them! Then Joshua makes his first contact with what appears to be a stranger; but it is of course the Commander of the Lord's army, the real Jesus come to welcome and assure him that all is well. (see Joshua 5:13 - 15).

As we take the risk, and re-focus our belief systems and our ideas of Christ away from the pale version built from our past experiences, and onto the Holy Spirit revealed truth lifted from the pages of the gospel, he comes to us too, and tells us that he has given Jericho into our hands. So what is it today that is represented by Jericho in our Old Testament analogy? Well, the walls of innumerable Jericho-like cities litter the landscape. Anywhere that we see people shut up tightly in bondage, these are cities whose walls need to come tumbling down. All our sicknesses and injuries, mental illnesses and

broken relationships; these are the equivalent of the cities and towns that represented sin, these are the things that keep people locked up behind walls separating them from the liberty to be found in Christ.

So how did Joshua do it? How did he get those walls to fall over? He was able to do it surprisingly easily through the revelation of a kingdom secret. Did he gather a large army? No. Did he set up massive Internet prayer chains? No. Did he wage a war of words in the public domain to swing political opinion? No. Did he fast and be vigilant in prayer for weeks in the hope that God would help him? No. So ... what did he do? He simply, and persistently, proclaimed the existence of the living God! He took the Ark of the Lord with the Shekhinah riding atop, the glorious presence of God, the living Word; and he had the people follow it. That's all he did. The trumpeters blew their horns; they boldly glorified God with



all their might. And that's the kingdom secret. To wander

through the gospels and the book of Acts shows

two words often used together – "teaching" and "preaching". Usually the subject being taught is not mentioned, but the subject being preached or proclaimed is – it is the good news of the kingdom! Time after time we read of multitudes of healings happening all around these proclamations. The message is clear – Jesus rarely prayed for the sick; he simply proclaimed the good news and the sick got healed! Kingdom living means proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and watching the Holy Spirit confirming what is said with signs and wonders following.

Today, in sad contrast, we use all the secular and religious techniques we can muster to try and persuade heaven to intervene; and too often turn our faces from unresolved prayer requests for fear of losing faith. But wait, there is great hope – there is still the God-ordained, God-inspired, way of doing things, the kingdom way! Of course some will ask: "Does everyone get instantly healed?" Joshua did not win every battle. It was certainly God's will that they should have the land, just as it is God's



# Proclamation of Power, Heart of Humility

"I tell you the truth, my Father will give you whatever you ask in my name." (John 16.23)

At first glance, Jesus' promise to the one who asks: "... in Christ's name!" would seem to be an open cheque, giving a guarantee of their request being summarily granted as if the words were a magic incantation. However, it isn't the words that allow God to move, as the seven sons of Sceva found out in Acts 19, it is the heart of the person confessing the words.

Jesus' teaching in John 16 was within the context of bringing glory to God the Father through the Son. In particular, Jesus' words on answered prayer were inextricably related to all that he had just said about being one with the Father. As a result of his perfect union with the Father, Jesus prayed to God in a spirit of complete obedience and total love. Therefore, we are to understand Jesus' words as meaning: "When you live in complete union with me and the Father – the same sort of loving union as I enjoy with him – you will ask only for what is in complete harmony with the Father's will, and I will work in you and through you in a way that glorifies the Father in granting your request."

We gain a similar appreciation of how answered prayer relates to the state of our heart from John 15.16, 17: "Then the Father will give you whatever you ask in my name. This is my command: Love each other." How necessary it is for us to fulfil Jesus' command to love each other, if we are to indeed see our prayers answered in the way Jesus has said they will be.

Both conditions, of glory being brought to God, and of love being our inspiration, are reemphasised in John 14.12-14. "...I am going to the Father. And I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Son may bring glory to the Father. You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it. If you love me, you will obey what I command."

"If you love me, you will obey what I command." This is the key for us to have our prayers answered. We discern the same message in John 15.4: "Abide in me, and I in you." While the verse is short, the response required is the very heart-beat of Christian faith. Challenging, yes .... but liberating, totally and eternally! In Christ we can truly do all things; let us be in Christ. Amen.

will that we should have the kingdom, but he had to fight for it, and so will we. He lost some and won most, but in the end they got there. So will we!

So here's the question – are we prepared to give back to God all we think we know about the healing ministry, and step out into the flooding river? Are we ready to ask for, and to apply, the freely-given dynamic knowledge of the good news of the kingdom? It's worth it; the kingdom of God is near to you, Jesus said so, and multitudes wait to follow over the river and into the Promised Land. Open ears can hear the Holy Spirit saying once again: "Step forward! Go!"

### WHY DO SOME NOT BELIEVE IN HEALING

Even as we see God at work healing the sick through our prayers, we are also very aware of the scepticism of some believers, even Christian authors of great repute. They may even advise Christians to cool their ardor, and to stop encouraging people to look to God for their healing. To these leaders, false hope is engendered

by people like us who are encouraging Christians to launch out and pray for the sick to be healed. Some of these authors are undoubtedly gifted, with great insights into the Gospel; indeed, I personally have been greatly blessed by reading their books. However, they say that in their experience people who pray for healing are usually disappointed, and that we should stop giving them false hope. "Miraculous healing just doesn't happen." It doesn't?

There is an answer to those who would say you are just setting people up for heart-break. Those who are not healed deal with it in the same way as they deal with disappointment when medical treatments don't cure them. They still know that doctors are dedicated to bringing a remedy; how much more can we be assured that God still loves us, and has a plan for us, irrespective of the physical evidence of our ailment, serious or not, cured or not.

Perhaps the critics of healing prayer simply haven't seen anyone healed through words of faith. How do we resolve this enigma; of a Christian not experiencing answers to prayers

# Victory in Jesus!

35-year old Kausalya, mother of four children, lived in Kartarpur village in India. Her third child had been crippled by a bout of polio, and wherever his mother went he had to be carried about on her back. To the poor woman the situation seemed totally hopeless, leaving her without any peace or even a reason to live. She used to perform various pujas and rituals to appease her gods in order to get some relief from her distress. Everyone in the neighbourhood knew about her pathetic condition.

Then one afternoon, as Kausalya passed by a painted board, her curiosity was aroused as she read about a person who prayed for the sick. On a Sunday morning Kausalya and her son came over to hear what the 'padri' (pastor) had to say. Yesudasan opened his Bible and began sharing about the woman who had suffered an issue of blood for 12 long years, given up by the doctors, but healed by Jesus.

Back at home Kausalya gently massaged her son's legs, saving the words "Jai Masih Ki!", which means: "Victory in Jesus!" In the third week an incredible miracle occurred; the boy who had needed to be carried around came walking to the prayer meeting! The neighbours were so surprised to see the one who had been a cripple now walking and playing freely that they too had to know about the preacher who prayed for the sick, and soon a steady flow of visitors began attending the prayer service.

Then the disciples went out and preached everywhere, and the Lord worked with them and confirmed his word by the signs that accompanied it." (Mark 16.20)





of healing, when our own reality is that prayer is surely answered, often with amazing results? One consideration is that the minister of healing prayer needs to have experienced the Baptism of the Spirit. On the day of Pentecost a real change took place in the lives of the Apostles, and of the 3,000 people who were baptized. They

were endued with power from on high! Can we expect to do what they did without the same power? O wonderful promise! "...how much more will your Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!" (Luke 11.13)

Another key to healing is that the person who prays needs to have expectant faith. If we pray without believing that God wants to heal his child, will it be surprising if no healing takes place? Jesus' rebuke to his disciples seems harsh, but if he walked on the earth today perhaps we might hear similar words: "O faithless and perverse generation, how long shall I be with you? How long shall I bear with you?" (Matthew 17.17) How merciful, gracious and longsuffering is our God towards us.

Whatever the reasons for pravers having remained unanswered, we can't ignore Jesus' commission in Mark 16: "Go into all the world and preach the good news to all creation."

Nor can we fail to anticipate the promised results of that preaching: ...they will place their hands on people, sick and they will get well.'

# **ORDER OF ST. LUKE**

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I am writing this during the season of Advent, and even though it will be a while after this that you read these words I want to make some comments about the gospel reading from the Second Sunday of this special season of the church. In the opening verses of Luke 3 we are told that John the Baptist came into the region around the Jordan 'proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.' This he did in preparation for the coming of one greater than himself - Jesus, the long awaited Messiah.

In these verses Luke says all this happened when:

- Tiberius was emperor of Rome
- · Pontius Pilate was Governor of Judea
- Herod was ruler of Galilee
- · Philip was ruler of Ituraea and Trachonitis
- · Lysanias was ruler of Abilene

· Annas and Caiaphas were high priests. In other words, what Luke is saying, is that this is no 'fairy tale'. It happened at a specific point in time, in the real world, among real people. The preaching of John the Baptist, and the birth and ministry of Jesus of Nazareth are historical events. God entered our world in the person of Jesus of Nazareth!

The other thing that Luke is saying here is that the coming of John the Baptist and the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem represented a real challenge to the power brokers of this world. Events in an insignificant corner of the Roman Empire were God's way of challenging those who appear to order human affairs, and of changing our attitudes to power for ever. And so it was that John and Jesus so challenged the powers of their day, both civil and religious, that they were put to death. But out of Jesus' death arose an unstoppable movement of God that has never been defeated by the powers of this world, no matter how hard they have tried, nor ever will be. In recent history alone we have witnessed how the authorities in places like China and Eastern Europe have tried to destroy the church. Today these are the very places in the world where the church is growing mightily! We have also seen how people like William Wilberforce, in the power of Christ, challenged the evil of slavery and eventually prevailed. As followers of Christ we may not be called upon to directly confront the global powers of this world, but we each have the God given power to challenge sin and evil wherever we live and work. Last, but not least, these words in Luke remind us that in a world where terror, destruction and sin seem to be getting the upper hand, God is still in control and always will be; His is the final word.

"He showed them his hands and side". Jn 20:20

We often say: "Seeing is believing!" And in a court of law the witness who can say: "I was there, and I saw this and that happen", is the one whose testimony will carry the most weight in reaching a decision. In one sense the

resurrection is the hardest miracle in which to believe. In another sense, when you weigh up the evidence in the stories told, it is difficult not to be convinced that it really did happen. Jesus knew that the disciples would be stunned by his appearing. They would wonder if the person before them really was himself, or someone like him, or a ghost. Then he showed them his hands and side; there were the nail-prints in his hands, and there was the wound made by the spear in his side. Only he - the real Jesus - could show evidence like that. No doubt their eyes popped out of their heads at the sight.

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Certainly their minds must have boggled, before they experienced unimaginable joy; joy far greater than the brief understatement in scripture would imply: "He showed them His hands and His side. Then the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord." (John 20.20)

We have not seen what they saw. We believe, though, because they saw - and we believe because of their testimony. They played pivotal roles in the gospel story. Without their having seen him alive after the crucifixion, and without their having faithfully passed on that record, we would have nothing to believe in. They not only passed on a narrative, they passed on a faith - and this is the faith by which we live today. If they had not told their story, and passed on their unwavering belief, then the story of Jesus would have been nothing more than that, a strange tale from antiquity.

"Have you ever prayed for the Lord to bless your boss's business?" I asked.

"No, I've never thought of it."

"If your boss gets blessed so will you. We will pray now." So we committed his employer's prosperity to the Lord.

The next week he came back beaming: "It worked! The boss wrote up more than a million dollars worth of orders, and now we are on overtime!"

The message from the bible about our attitude to work is very clear: "... obey your earthly masters in everything; and do it, not only when their eye is on you and to win their favor, but with sincerity of heart and reverence for the Lord. Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving." (Colossians 3.22-24)

In terms of having respect for our employer, and integrity in fulfilling our responsibilities, we can learn a lot from Joseph. His was a perfect example of how diligence with a little leads to positions of ever greater trust; not to mention blessings for employer and employee alike. Joseph's status in life went in stages from the lowest point a human being could be at, sitting in a pit facing death, to becoming prime minister of the most powerful country of his era. Truly, the potential for our own lives to count is also limitless, for we can rely upon God to bless anyone who follows his advice: "Whatever your hand finds to do, do with all your might." (Ecclesiastes 9.10)

As it is, it is the indisputable evidence of a living faith, the unshakeable foundation of the only true hope for mankind.

That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked at and our hands have touched-this we proclaim concerning the Word of life. We write this to make your joy complete." (1 John 1.1-4)

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
