God Can Change The Past

Virtually everyone would like to change the past. Knowing what we know now, if we had our lives to live over again, there are surely many things that we would do differently. But far above and beyond those events and decisions, there was a singular incident from our collective past that desperately needed a different choice to have been made - that fateful response to the original temptation in the Garden of Eden. It was the model of all our subsequent failures; each leading to the same result of bitter regret experienced by every person who has ever lived, with the exception of Jesus Christ. And that exception, the perfect obedience of our Saviour, enabled God to change the past. He changed it in the sense that the consequences of sin no longer define our eternal destiny, and neither do they define our present experience. We are freed from both the penalty and the power of sin! "Those whom the Son sets free shall be free indeed!" (John 8:36) Praise God!

So, with God's open arms welcoming us through the gates of heaven, and with our eternal security as his beloved child assured, why do so many of us, committed though we are, sense that we aren't experiencing all that we should be of the blessings that God says are rightfully ours? Part of the answer is found in this quote from Pete Greig, author of *Red Moon Rising* and 24-7, "There can be no movement in our lives until we are confronted with the reality of our current state." You see, being well aware of our failings isn't enough; it's so easy to simply accept them as being part of us. However, to be "confronted" with our self is to have a motivation to seek change. If we aren't yet motivated, then our prayer needs to be, "Lord, make me want to become all that you would have me be." Surely this is one prayer that is guaranteed to bring results. God's heart must be delighted when he is invited to bring forth "... beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness; that [we] might be called trees of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, that he might be glorified." (Isaiah 61:3)

Prayer isn't primarily about changing the world, it's about communion between us and God. The most simple prayer we can utter is the entreaty made by Jesus' disciple, "Lord, teach us to pray." As we make that most basic of requests, God will respond, "... you will call to me. You will come and pray to me, and I will answer you. You will seek me, and you will find me because you will seek me with all your heart. Yes, I say, you will find me ..." (Jeremiah 29:12-14). Then, when we find God as promised, we will be miraculously transformed, as we are remade in the image of Christ. In a real sense our past will have been changed, as God fulfils his heart desire and attributes his Son's righteousness to us. "I will be their God, and they will be my people ... I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more." (Jeremiah 31:33-34)

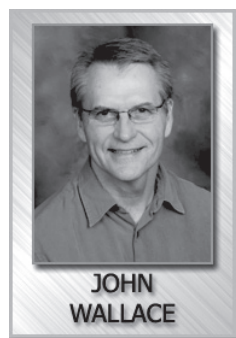
Prophecy Heals

Not long ago I was leading a worship and prayer meeting in an area of clubs, bars and restaurants near downtown Dallas. As we sang and prayed, I noticed a friend of mine walk in with another man, whom I assumed he knew. I shortly received and shared a prophetic word for this young man that went something like this: "The Lord says that it is time for you to begin to act like your name. It's time to be who you were designed to be. Your father and mother, when they named you, may not have been aware of God's spiritual intention for you, but your name was planned by God." Then, when I asked him what his name was, he replied "Christian." The two left the meeting before I could talk with them, but I later received a text from my friend telling me that he had first met Christian out drinking on the street, where he had talked to him and had invited him to come into our meeting. My friend led this young man to the Lord. "Christian" became a Christian!

Prophecy heals the spirit

The exercise of the prophetic gift is for "exhortation, edification, and consolation" (1 Cor. 14:3), and it is wonderful how the Father can use it to heal us: body, soul and spirit. The young man's spirit was healed when he received a word from God. It says a little later in 1 Corinthians 14, "If all prophesy, and an unbeliever or an ungifted man enters, he is convicted by all, he is called to account by all; the secrets of his heart are disclosed; and so he will fall on his face and worship God, declaring that God is certainly among you." The exercising of prophecy announces that God is in the house; he is present among us; he is present in power! When prophecies have begun to come forth I have witnessed people spontaneously delivered from demons. Prophecy certainly heals the spirit.

a word changed places with his wife; who had just been praying, "Lord, if nothing happens to my husband, this is the end." When she entered the meeting room I immediately noticed her, and had a prophetic word well up inside me. I called out her name in a loud voice and said, "The Lord says that 'The end is the beginning!'" She melted into a

tearful puddle. Deep, deep healing can occur when our Father gives us words that strengthen and comfort us. Her Father knew exactly what this woman needed to hear. God could have simply left it to her husband to tell her what had happened to him (which he did, of course, followed by his whole life and ministry becoming enlivened with the presence of God), but it was more powerful and meaningful for her to receive a prophetic word directly from her Heavenly Father.

Prophecy heals the body

Prophetic ministry, especially when combined with words of knowledge about physical conditions, can bring healing to the body. I believe a good, simple, working definition of prophecy is: what God wants us to know at a given time. What God wants us to know may involve past, present, or future events. Many times the Holy Spirit will give specific knowledge (a knowledge the receiver would otherwise not have known) about names, physical conditions, or indeed just about anything. These words not only communicate truth,

Years ago we were having nightly Renewal Meetings in which the Lord was manifesting himself in powerful ways. One night a married couple who had been friends of ours came to the meeting. The husband had been a pastor of a church that "didn't make it." In discouragement and anger he had bailed out of the ministry, and wasn't really following the Lord, which left his wife very distraught. They had a special-needs child, and during the first part of the meeting the wife stayed in the hallway with her son while the husband came into the meeting. I approached the man, who had that certain look on his face: "Come on and take your best shot, John!" I just raised my hand and said, "Come, Lord!" whereupon my friend was knocked backwards by the power of God through two rows of chairs and onto the floor. After staying there for several minutes he staggered out to the hallway, and without

DREAMS - Have we been missing help from God?

For the most part, the Church has had little time for angelic visitation, visions of the future, divinely inspired dreams, or a vast number of other God-encounters. These are somehow ignored, without reference to their regular occurrence in scripture. Yet I have watched 90-year-olds weep as they related their encounters with God and his heavenly agents. I have seen the wide-eyed wonder of 4-year-olds

as they tell, in their own childlike way, the truth of what they are seeing on a daily and nightly basis. It's natural that a real relationship with a supernatural God, who is himself Spirit, comprises spiritual experiences. Life in the Spirit is beyond exciting, as it opens the eyes of our understanding, leading to awe and wonder at how gloriously alive God really is!

Sadly, many of today's believers are like computers that haven't been programmed to open the documents sent from Heaven. Too many of us are left wondering, "Was it just a dream?" Then there are some who insist that God wouldn't give us something we couldn't understand. But read very closely what is recorded in the book of Job, "For God speaks in one way, or, in another, yet man does not perceive it. In a dream, in a vision of the night, when deep sleep falls upon men, while they are slumbering on their beds, then he opens the ears of men, and seals their instruction." (Job 33:14-16) In these verses we find that God can speak to man – and not only does man not understand the dream, but he doesn't even know God was speaking! It might be said that he has ears to hear but does not hear, and he has eyes to see but does not see. Surely God doesn't want this to be our lot.

We cannot discount what we don't understand; the key is to seek to make sense of what God has chosen to reveal to us. While our culture may have placed a veil over dreams and their interpretation, it doesn't mean God no longer speaks through them. Dreams are much, much more than a curiosity; when correctly interpreted they are a profound agent of change. Throughout Scripture, births were foretold, nations formed, lives saved and destinies established, all through these surreal parables. Is it any wonder kings scoured the earth to find someone who could solve the mystery of what had troubled them so deeply the night before? Until they are interpreted, dreams are just a riddle, a divine enigma. We might know God has spoken, but if we don't know what he has said then our dream can remain a treasure hidden in the midst of the obvious. Our task then is to uncover the keys of interpretation, which God has placed right in front of us, if we just know where to look.

As in any learning activity, we have to study to find the answers, and the Bible is just filled with examples of how God speaks. A surprising one third of the Bible directly relates to dreams



or visions sent from God. (Interestingly enough, this correlates to the fact that most of us will sleep for one third of our lives.) If we were to remove everything in Scripture that relates to dreams and visions, we would remove hundreds of pages! Through the prophet Joel, God said that in the last days he would speak to us through prophecy, dreams, visions, signs and wonders. So, if God told us long ago

that he would speak to us in these ways, how can we have the audacity to tell him that we don't believe he can do this, or that we don't want him to do so?! Surely he knows the best way to communicate with each of us.

Yes, dreams are full of mysteries and paradoxes, but then so is Scripture. The Bible is replete with prophetic parables, many of which are mysteries within mysteries, but that doesn't stop us from seeking to understand them. It is the same with those riddles of the night. I have found that God takes joy in having us search for the understanding of what he has partially revealed. It draws us closer to Him; and as we have a revelation of that which is beyond our natural understanding, our hearts become filled with awe. Whenever our walk of faith becomes boring, it is due to a lack of wonder. Oh that more churches gave real veneration to our Lord and our God!

One cannot deeply discuss dreams and visions without touching on other spiritual phenomena; including prophecy, visitations from angels, transportations and the transcendence of time. All of these spiritual experiences, and more, took place along with the dreams and visions recorded in the Bible, and they are still taking place today! Some don't readily share their experiences; and others will claim that we shouldn't reveal the "divinum mysterium" to the spiritually immature. But isn't that precisely what was legislated in the Dark Ages, when the Church let only priests possess and read the Bible? Yes, maturity is required, but on the other hand we can act as if the Holy Spirit doesn't know what we need; as if he doesn't know to whom he should give his gifts. Let us choose to believe that the Spirit of God knows what he is doing!

I have watched as the hardest of hearts melted when dreams that were not understood for years were finally interpreted. I have seen giants of men weep until they had no more tears, as God revealed to them, through dreams, how he has loved them since they were children. Just recently, a politician clung to me for strength as God gave him the solution to a national problem through the interpretation of a dream he had had a few nights earlier. We shouldn't be surprised, for God said the following, "And it shall come to pass afterward that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh; your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, your young men

and focus someone's attention, but they can also engender great faith.

At one church meeting I received a word of knowledge that someone was present who had been, and was still, suffering from severe abdominal pain. A young lady raised her hand, declaring, "That's me!" When this woman came up to our prayer ministry team, she told us she had suffered severe, constant pain in her abdomen for six weeks, and she was scheduled to see a medical doctor the very next day. As we prayed, the Lord completely healed her. As she began to weep, she said through her tears, "It means more to me than being healed that the Lord would pick me out of a crowd to show me His love." How many times have I seen this same kind of Holy Spirit ministry bring about the exact same result. God is in the business of showing his amazing, mind-blowing love for us in so many ways. It's overwhelming!

Psalm 107:20 declares of our Lord: "He sent His word and healed them, and delivered them from their destructions." How wonderful that our Heavenly Father's word heals us; and prophecy is one of the ministries through which that word is delivered and through which that healing takes place.

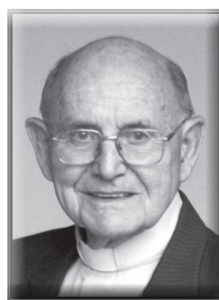

Healed of Cancer

A few months ago, when I was on holiday in Auckland, I became ill and was taken by ambulance to hospital, where I was diagnosed with cancer of the gallbladder. Upon returning to Christchurch I was admitted for treatment, after an X-ray had shown my gallbladder was four times larger than normal, and a blood test reading of over 500 had confirmed the presence of cancer in my body. However, upon the specialist's advice I was sent home, since an operation would have resulted in the diseased cells spreading to my liver.

An overseas healing ministry was visiting church, but at the meeting I didn't actually hear anything the speaker said. However, as the sun shone on my head through a side window, it was as if the Lord and I were enveloped together in a great light. He gave me the words of a hymn, "She only touched the hem of his garment and straightway she was whole. He turned and said, 'Daughter, be of good cheer, your faith has made you whole.'" There were also the words, "To get a touch from the Lord is so real." At the time I didn't even realize that these were two different songs!

While many people maintained prayer for me, the Lord continued to give me verses from the Bible, which I looked up in a concordance and found that they all spoke of healing. One was Psalm 118:17: "I shall not die but live, and shall declare the works and recount the illustrious acts of the Lord." Another was Mark 5:19: "... bring back word to them of how much the Lord has done for you." This is always how the Lord speaks to me. He puts two verses of scripture together, then, when I check their context, the Holy Spirit makes them real to me.

When I next returned to the specialist, he gave me the results of the most recent tests: a blood test reading of 30, and an X-ray showing my gallbladder was back to normal size! Praise the Lord God, I was totally healed! He had done it, and all the glory and praise were His! I have just read *The Real Faith* by Charles Price, and it confirmed my experience that we do not need to struggle and work in our own strength to claim healing. God even gives us the faith to believe for a miracle; after all, it's his faith! We are healed as we receive it from him. "Praise the Lord, my soul, and forget not all his benefits - who forgives all your sins and heals all your diseases." (Psalm 103:2,3)

to all God has in store for my every moment. Sometimes I feel like I'm the reluctant, contrary child. Paul longed for Heaven, but was willing to stay as long as God wanted him to, "For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain. If I am to go on living in the body, this will mean fruitful labour for me. Yet what shall I choose? I do not know! Given My Life Back

In August 2011 I was diagnosed with Stage 3 non-Hodgkin lymphoma. There were small tumours in my neck and much larger ones in my abdomen. The fact that they were both above and below my diaphragm was significant, and put me in the Stage 3 category. The largest in my abdomen was wrapped around my aorta. And I had thought I'd just pulled a muscle carrying our eldest grandchild!



I realized how tender a soul my GP was, as she arrived in tears at our home to tell me of the diagnosis. She had called first to get our permission to come, as she'd never visited previously. That same night we learned that my husband's eldest brother, a radiologist involved in my case, had got drunk, something we'd never, ever, heard of before. We knew this was serious. Confirmation came from the haematologist when I asked, "What if I don't have chemotherapy?" and he replied, "You'll have only a few months."

Throughout the preliminary testing and all the procedures, I had amazing peace. During the treatment, I was able to recall scripture verses, sing and meditate; not feeling at all disturbed or anxious, despite the fact that I had made up my mind I was going to die. This prompted me to write letters to my husband and children and their spouses. Then I was led to the book *Kitchen Table Wisdom* by Dr. Rachel Naomi Remen, who had been a patient since her teens. She talked about visualizing something you imagine as being extraordinarily potent attacking the cancer cells. I thought of the most positive power in the universe - the light of Christ flooding me with his power and healing. The crowd of witnesses of Hebrews 12:1 has always had powerful significance for me, but never more so than at this time, as I imagined my mother, my grandfather and his sister all encouraging me from their home in heaven.

I had learnt some verses and Christian songs in other languages through the work of the Bible Society, and they were now of great help, lifting me to a plane beyond my current

circumstances. Some verses from 2 Peter 1:3,4 were etched in my brain: "His divine power has given us everything we need for a godly life through our knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness. Through these he has given us his very great and precious promises, so that through them you may participate in the divine nature ..." My brother had once embossed those words on a leather wall-hanging, which I hadn't seen for many years, but they now came flooding back to me with the deepest significance. Then the August edition of *Wholeness* arrived, and there were those very verses being expounded on the front page! God's confirmation and encouragement were so timely.

Meanwhile, from August to December 2011, I had eight sessions of chemotherapy. Halfway through this time my brother-in-law rang to find out if anyone had told me the result of a second PET scan. They hadn't - I'd had it only that day! He said in his quiet voice, "It is clear." The tumours were gone! We know he couldn't believe it by the change in his manner; previously he had been unable to converse or even look at us. After this he spoke several times with my husband about how absolutely remarkable my recovery was.

Today I still see the haematologist at 6 monthly intervals, and wonder if the blood tests will show anything. It's a trait of human nature that we can't always grasp the reality of our healing. Others with whom I have conversed have had the same questions as mine: "Is it forever? Why have I been healed, when so many others have not? What am I meant to do with the rest of my life - with this second chance?" At present I have retired from my part-time school job to look after two grandchildren while their mother works part time. The youngest was born 6 days after I learned the tumours were gone, and it's such a blessing to see her grow and to be a significant part of her life.

The ultimate blessing from my healing is to be thankful for every day, and to look forward

Why Life's Storms?

"Behold, a violent storm came up on the sea, so much that the boat was covered with the waves, but he was asleep." (Matthew 8.24)

It wasn't the disciples' idea to put their boat out to sea. If they had set sail without Jesus asking them to then they would not have had the same reason to expect protection and rescue. The lesson we learn here is this - storms may arise even when we're doing exactly what we're supposed to be doing as Christians. We shouldn't be discouraged by the difficulties or troubles that come, and conclude that somehow we've stepped out of God's will.

We see that Christ's presence with his disciples did not keep the storm away. There are no promises in the Bible that believers won't encounter trials. Faith builds no high walls around us providing protection from the troubles that will come just as surely to the Christian as to the non-believer. There are the storms of temptation, which sweep down with such terrific power from the precipitous mountains of the human condition. Then there are the storms of disappointment, sorrow



and adversity, whose waves would attempt to totally overwhelm us. In fact, Jesus told us exactly what to expect: "In the world you will have tribulation ..." but he also told us to "... be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." (John 16:33)

On the Sea of Galilee, a boat can at one moment be gliding smoothly over a glassy-smooth surface, unbroken by a ripple, and then without warning it can become tossed on the angry waves whipped up by a tempest that appeared from nowhere. This is exactly how most of life's storms arrive; temptations come when we are not looking for them, disasters arrive unheralded. One moment we're sitting at peace in our living room, then the phone rings with the news that a close loved-one has just died, or someone whom we trusted totally has betrayed us. The most distressing traumas of life are nearly always sudden surprises. We can't prepare for every eventuality; but we can trust in the One who knows what lies ahead. "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the strength of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?" (Psalm 27:1)

"He himself was in the stern, asleep on the cushion, and they woke him up, and told him, 'Teacher, don't you care that we are dying?'" (Mark 4.38)

These words imply that the disciples thought Jesus didn't care about them in their dire predicament; that he was neglecting them by sleeping while they might die. This was not true at all, for they were never safer than they were at that moment in the middle of the storm, for the boat the Lord travelled on could not sink. Faith should have trusted despite the turmoil. Yet don't we also, at least in our hearts, say the same thing to our Lord? When we are in great difficulty, and he doesn't come to save us; when we seem about to be crushed by the waves of adversity, and no relief comes down from heaven, do we never say, "Lord,



don't you care that I'm sinking?" When we pray so hard and for so long for a heavy burden to be lifted, and no answer comes, does the thought not arise in our minds that Jesus doesn't hear us?

It may sometimes appear that Jesus isn't appreciating the severity of our dilemma; but he always, always, has our highest good at heart. In this instance the disciples would learn that Christ alone could deliver them from that which was out of their control. They could never have learned this without the storm, and without their Master being asleep. Like the disciples, we have lessons we cannot learn until Christ withholds his help for a season; but in the interim he is never indifferent to our plight. He never forgets nor neglects us; he is always paying attention, and at the right moment he will come to help us. Then we will realise that he was there all the time. We can trust Jesus just as he trusted his Father. "In peace I will lie down and sleep, for you alone, O Lord, will keep me safe." (Psalm 4:8)
